## PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION,

AT THE
REGULAR MEETING, HELD JUNE 22, 1887.

Normal University, Normal, Ill., June 22, 1887.
The Board of Education met in the reception room of the University, at 9 o'clock A. M.

In the absence of a President, the Board was called to order by the Secretary.
The following members were found to be present: Messrs. Atwood, Benedict, Cope, Dodge, Gastman, Green, Harrington, Knickerbocker, Laab, Roots, Sandham, Slade, Walker and Edwards. A'bsent-Lesem.
The reading of the minutes of the regular meeting, held December 8, 1886, and of the special meeting, held February 1, 1887, was by vote dispensed with.

It was voted to proceed to the election of a President. Judge Knickerbocker was appointed teller. E. A. Gastman was found to have received all the votes cast but one, and was declared elected.

On motion, the Board proceeded to elect a Treasurer for the next two years. Hon. Thos. F. Mitchell, having received all the votes cast, was declared elected.

It was moved by Judge Knickerbocker that the report of the Treasurer be referred to the Committee on Auditing and Finance, and the motion prevailed.
Dr. Hewett, the President of the University, then read the following report:

## To the Honorablc Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Gentlemen: The Illinois State Normal University has now eompleted thirty years of active life. And the fear now closing has been as prosperous, in my opinion, as any previous year. The only serious drawbacks for the last two terms have been caused by the irregularities arising from prevalent illness, among our pupils and their friends. During the winter, colds and other diseases incident to winter and early spring interfered mueh with our attendance. This term, measles, mumps and scarlet fever have been even more troublesome. Yet, no death has occurred, among our number; nor am I aware that any one has been very seriously ill.

Miss Orist and Mr. Kasbeer receive both diplomas. Mr. Gray graduates this month from Harvard College. He completed about two-thirds of our course before going to Cambridge, and the other studies he has passed there. He is an excellent young man, a good scholar, and purposes to be a teacher. The Faculty cordially recommend that he should have our diploma.

## THE FACULTY.

I hand you herewith the resignations of Professor Stetson and Miss Fell. Professor Stetson has served us faithfully for twenty-five years, and you are all acquainted with his work; some of you have known him for many of those years. Miss Fell proposes to take a tour abroad.

Professor 'DeGarmo and Miss Hanna are closing their flrst year with us, as teachers in the Normal School. I am pleased to say that both have been faithful in their work, and I believe they have done it successfully. Of the other teachers, I have nothing further to say than that they have shown their accustomed faithfulness another year.

Our assistants are all ladies, and a majority of them are likely to be ladies in the future. This meets my approval; but I have long thought it would be well to create, as opportunity may present itself, one or two assistants' places, to be flled by young men. I recommend that low salaries be attached to these places. with the express understanding that they be regarded as temporary positions. Our bright and ambitious young men can well afford to take such places for a time at a low salary for the experience and prestige it would give them: and under the direction of the Professor in charge of their work, their strength and enthusiasm can be used to good advantage.

I desire that one of our lady assistants may have time and authority to give some special oversight to our young ladies. We have from two to three hundred young women in the Normal department, and I think their oversight demands more time and attention than can be given at odd moments by those whose time is so fully occupied with class recitations.

## THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

Notwithstanding the little flurry following the late decision of the Supreme Court, have treated us in a way that leayes no ground for complaint. They granted us all the appropriations we asked for, and with much less opposition than we have encountered in some previous years.

## FTNANGES

I think your Treasurer's report will show that our finances are in a safe and healthy condition. The income from tuition has been large; I have paid over to the Treasurer more than 86.000 from this source, during the current year, and some more remains to be collected. Our catalogue for this year will cost us about $\$ 150.00$; the cost is very low, and an appropriation should be made to pay the bill as soon as the work is done.

## REPATRS.

I think we are now in a condition to complete the needed repairs on our building. The steps on the east and west fronts should be put in order; the floors in the halls of the basement and of the first floor seriously need attention; and some of the blackboards need repairing. I am not aware of any other repairs needed at present, but the grand piano in Normal Hall, which has done service for more than twenty-five years, is no longer fit to use. We should have a new one. I very much wish that something could be done to improve our grounds. They are beautiful now, and they have great capacity for much more beauty. But their attractiveness often makes them the resort of persons whose presence is not desirable. It has occurred to me that some arrangement might be made with the municipal authoritles, by which some needed improvements might be made, and at the same time better police oversight might be secured. I have no matured plan to present but I merely suggest that perhaps something might be done that would benefit both parties;

LIBRARY.
As I have done for a long time, I am constantly adding to our collection of books, but am not buying any great quantities at a time. I think the increase is better made in that way, and hope you will appropriate about $\$ 200$ to that purpose at this time. I think the students are making more and better use of the library from year to year.

## EXPOSITION AT CHICAGO.

We have taken steps to have the work of our Institution properly represented at the Exposition to be held at Chicago, in connection with the meeting of the National Educational Association next month; The Faculty appointed Professor Seymour to have charge of this matter, and he has giyen it thorough attention. I think his plan will secure a representation that will do us credit. I recommend that a suitable sum be appropriated for this purpose.

## OUR NUMBERS.

As I have said before, our numbers the present year exceed all precedent. More than 900 different names will appear in our catalogue. exceeding the number of last year by more than one hundred. A part of this increase is in the Model Department; but it is mostly in the lower classes of the Normal Department. The number in the senior and middle classes varies from that of last year but very little. If the usual proportion of those in the lower class return next year. and the new classes should be as large as they have been this year, we
shall be seriously embarrassed. During the winter term, we were obliged to seat students on the teachers' platform; our recitation rooms, too, are filled to their utmost capaeity. It is to be hoped that we may retain a larger number than heretofore, to complete the full work of our course.

## PROFESSIONAL WORK.

Professors Cook, MeCormick and De Garmo have given much time this year to directing, overseeing and unifying the work of their several departments, in the classes of the Model School. Their work has borne excellent fruit, both with the students of the Model School, and with the pupil-teachers. It is proposed to make increased efforts along this line, in the future.

With this report I submit reports from Professors Seymour and Cook, respecting work in their several rooms, and the expenditure of moneys heretofore appropriated to them.

The opinion of the Attorney-General in regard to the proper use to be made of money received from the sale of land donated by Wm. T. Major was then read. The opinion is as follows:

## Hon. Heniy Raab, Secretary, Etc.:

State of Iminnors,
Athorney-Generat OfFice Springfield, December 31, 1886.

DEAR SIR: I have your favor in behalf of the State Board of Education stating that said Board has received $\$ 800$ from the sale of land donated by William T. Major, in pursuance of his subscription of April 20, 1857, "in aid of a fund to be expended under the direction of said Board in erecting the necessary building or buildings; improving the site of the Normal University of the State of Illinois, as provided for by an act of the General Assembly of said State, approyed Tebruary 18, 1857," and asking whether this money must be kept as an endowment fund of which only the interest may be used in defraying the expenses of the Institation, or, whether it may be used for the ordinary expenses of the University.

Permit me to reply that, in my opinion, the Board may in its diseretion, either expend the principal sum for the purposes for which it was donated, or it may retain it as a fund and expend only the income therefrom for that purpose. The purposes, however, for which it may be used are erecting the necessary building or buildings or improving the site of the University. I do not think it proper to use either the principal or the income therefrom to defray the current expenses of operating the Institution. Its use should be limited to the purposes specified above, and in the instrument making the donation.

On motion, the opinion was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

On motion of Judge Green, the following resolutions, passed one year ago, were recommitted to the Committee on Text books and Course of Instruction:

1. That the amount of time devoted to teaching in the Training Department by each pupil-teacher should be doubled.
2. That the time devoted to reading, grammar and arithmetic should be doubled.
3. Astronomy, chemistry, zoölogy, spherical trigonometry and English literature should be elective studies.
4. The pupil who after pursuing the studies required to the present extent, or on examination, can carry 85, should be excused from one-half the time allotted to reading, grammar. arithmetic and teaching.
5. That the time devoted to geography and spelling be reduced one-half.
6. That the Committee on Text-books and Course of Instruction is requested to consider and report on the foregoing resolutions at the next meeting.
The Committee on Teachers and Salaries, through their chairman, Mr. Walker, presented the following report, which was adopted:

To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:
Your Committee on Teachers and Salaries recommend the following:
That the resignations of Prof. A. Stetson and Miss Fannie Fell be accepted.

That Miss Adella M. O. Hanna be elected to the position of Assistant in Language, with a salary of $\$ 800$.

That Miss Ida M. Hollis be elected to the position of Assistant in the High School for one year, with a salary of $\$ 800$,

That Miss Flora Pennell be elected Preceptress with a salary of $\$ 1,000$.
That Miss S. Annette Bowman, Teacher in Drawing, have full time, with salary of $\$ 800$.
That the salary of Mr. Rudoloh R. Reeder be increased $\$ 100$.

## On motion of Judge Green, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on Teachers and Salaries is requested to report for consideration to this Board, at its next regular meeting, the names of three persons who are qualified to hold and fll, and are willing to accept, the position vacated by Professor Stetson.
The Committee on Buildings and Grounds, through their Chair$\mathrm{man}, \mathrm{Mr}$. Slade, presented the following report, which on motion of Judge Knickerbocker, was adopted:

## To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Your committee on Buildings and Grounds would recommend the following special repairs, and ask the Board, at this meeting, to authorize and direct the same;

1. The change and improvements in the steam coils in the large hall of the University, recommended in the report of your committee at the last meeting of the Board. (See page 9 of the printed proceedings of the December meeting, 1886.). Estimated cost, $\$ 150$.
2. Your committee would ask for authority to either deepen one of the two wells on the grounds of the University, or to dig a new one, as may be thought best. Your committee understood that this was authorized at the last meeting of the Board; but the printed proceedings simply authorize the deepening of the old one. On a thorough investigation of the question, it may be thought best to dig a new well; and your committee would like the direct authority to do so, if found best. The old well- -the only one whose water is fit to useis now dry; and, as your committee before reported, our wells have always been inadequate in dry seasons. Estimated cost not exceeding $\$ 150$,
3. Your committee would further recommend, what was postponed at the last meeting on account of supposed inadequaey of funds, the removal of the old floor of the basement hall-way and the boys' dressing-room. Estimated cost, $\$ 100$.
4. The large water tanks in the left of the building, which are lined with lead, probably need more or less repairs on a thorough examination, which has not been made for a good many years. It is possible that on such examination quite expensive repairs may be needed. Your committee would therefore ask that it be authorized to make such repairs as may be found necessary and advisable in this regard.
5. Your committee would recommend that a brick walk be authorized, leading from the north door of the building to the street on the north. The present plank walk is practically worn out, and should be replaced by a substantial brick walk, and the old material be used in repairing the few remaining plank walks. 'Estimated cost about $\$ 200$.
6. Your committee further reports that the rubber hose in use in this bullding needs to be replaced with new hose. As we carry, no insurance on the building, and it is of the greatest importance that we should be always ready with the best appliances to extinguish incipient fires, your committee would recommend that it be authorized to purchase as much new rubber hose as may be necessary for general use and for fire purposes. Estimated cost
not exceeding $\$ 75$.
