# PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

#### OF THE

#### STATE OF ILLINOIS.

NORMAL, ILL., December 9, 1891.

The Board of Education met in the library of the University at 9 A. M., the President, William H. Green, in the chair.

All the members of the Board were present except Messrs. Brady, Robbins and Evans.

After a correction on page 15, line 19 from below, of the minutes of June 24, 1891, where \$800 was inserted in place of \$900, the minutes of June 24, 1891, were adopted as printed.

The President of the University then read his semi-annual report as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen: The one hundred and third term of the institution under your care began on September 7, and will close December 18.

#### THE ATTENDANCE.

The present term is the highest in the history of the school. The increase is noticeable in the Normal department. The enrollment is:

The entrance examinations have been made somewhat more difficult, and the number of failures on the part of applicants for admission to the Normal department has quite materially increased. Such persons usually enter the Preparatory department, however, and after a suitable preparation they are admitted to the Normal department.

While our new building will increase our capacity somewhat, it will not enable us to admit any larger number to the Normal department. The question is becoming a serious one. There are several ways in which the building may be changed so as to permit a large increase in the number of Normal pupils, but such changes will require an expenditure of five or six thousand dollars, hence it is needless to discuss them now.

I shall probably submit a plan for your consideration at the next meeting.

#### THE APPLICANTS

for admission to the Normal department numbered 217 ladies and 75 gentlemen. Of this number 41 were graduates of high schools, and were admitted upon presentation of their diplomas; 58 were appointed by county superintendents in accordance with the statute; 10 were admitted upon first grade certificates; 18 were promoted from the preparatory class, and 3 were admitted from the Southern Illinois Normal School. The remaining 162 were examined. Forty-six ladies and 22 gentlemen failed to meet the requirements for admission to free tuition.

Thirty of the applicants were from McLean county.

A rule of the Board requires an admission average of 85 per cent. from residents of this county, whereas residents of other counties are admitted if they reach an average of 60 per cent. on examination. Only five of the thirty were admitted to free tuition. Thirteen of the remaining twenty-five, making an average of 60 per cent. or more, were enrolled upon payment of tuition at the rate of \$39 a year.

The pupils admitted to the new class represent 71 different counties. The pupils admitted to free tuition are distributed as follows:

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#### THE GENERAL HEALTH

of the school has been good. The location has been shown to be an exceedingly healthful one. Ten pupils find their health improved to one who has a contrary experience.

Your attention is called to the admirable spirit manifested by our pupils. Recognizing the fact that they are to be teachers of the young, they endeavor to conform to all reasonable requirements with a promptness and faithfulness that cannot be too highly commended.

#### THE FACULTY.

Mr. Edward Manley tendered his resignation on June 29, to take effect August 31. He had been in the employ of the Board for three years, as assistant in the high school. His services were very acceptable, but an offer of the principalship of the Bloomington High School, with an increase of fifty per cent in his salary was too tempting an offer to be resisted.

I am obliged, also, to report the resignation of Miss Ruth Morris, our Preceptress and Professor of English Literature. She came here in 1888, as the sucessor of Miss Julia E. Kennedy, the primary training teacher. At the beginning of the winter term, last year, she was transferred to the Normal department as Miss Pennell's successor, and at the close of the year was appointed Professor of English Literature to succeed Professor Jones.

I can not easily express my sense of loss in being obliged to see Miss Morris leave the institution. She undertook no task that was not rarely performed. Her influence was in all respects inspiring and most admirable. The duty of finding her successor devolves upon the Board at this meeting.

Acting under the instructions of the Committee on Teachers and Salaries, I employed Jacob A. Bohrer, as Mr. Manley's successor, at a salary of \$850, and Miss Lucia W. Raines, as assistant in reading and as instructor in gymnastics, at a salary of \$800.

Mr. Bohrer graduated from our high-school department in 1887, and from Williams College last June. I had watched his course in college with great interest, knowing his excellent qualities, and expecting that we should need him to succeed Mr. Manley, whom I feared we should be unable to retain. Mr. Bohrer has given us entire satisfaction.

Miss Raines was recommended very highly by persons in whose judgment I had confidence. She is a Memphis lady, who has spent some years in fitting herself for the work of instruction in elocution and physical training. We are giving this work a thorough trial, and the results promise to be highly satisfactory.

Mrs. Lida P. McMurry, who was appointed assistant training teacher in the primary school, entered upon her work at the beginning of the present term. Her services are highly satisfactory. While employed in the town schools she superintended the work of several pupil teachers, and thus became so familiar with our system that she was not obliged to serve an apprenticeship in order to prepare herself for her duties.

#### THE TRAINING-SCHOOL BUILDING

is approaching completion somewhat slowly. The work has been well done, however, and that is at least some compensation for the vexatious delay. It will be ready for occupancy at some time next term. We shall be able to complete it and warm it. The old furniture must answer for a time, however. By the most rigid economy, and without disturbing the salaries of the employés, we have accumulated a sufficient surplus to pay for the heating plant and for the services of the supervising architect, and also to put the dry closet system into the basement. We are now corresponding with competing firms in order to secure the best bid for the job. When received, the plans and specifications will be submitted to the building committee.

#### THE LIBRARY

is steadily growing. I am endeavoring to supply the books that are most urgently needed. The figures furnished by the librarian show how rapidly the number of students that make use of it has increased.

By reference to the report of the President, in the last "Proceedings," you will observe that during the fall term of last year 2,515 books were taken from the room. During the winter term the number increased to 3,041, and during the spring term to 3,589. During the term now closing the number has reached 5,493. The room is a great improvement over our former facilities, but it is altogether too small to accommodate those desiring to use the Library. When the new building shall be occupied rooms No. 9 and No. 10 can be used instead of the present room. This will give us about two and a half times our present space, and will enable us to devote the reception room to its original purposes. The inconveniences to which the Board of Education is now subjected on account of the lack of a suitable room for meeting will then be removed and we shall again have a room that may be especially furnished for reception purposes.

I shall be able to report the expense of moving our present shelving and suitably preparing the rooms at the June meeting. If the plans meet the approbation of the Board the work can be completed in the summer.

#### THE GROUNDS

surrounding the building may well be the pride of the Board of Education, as they are of the citizens of this community. But nothing has been done that looks toward their proper ornamentation. I suggest that a beginning should be made in this direction, and that the rent of the Normal farm should be set aside, in whole or in part, for that purpose.

A man and team might be employed from May first to October first at a cost of about three hundred dollars, and a preparatory survey made and a system of improvements begun.

The changes in

#### THE COURSE OF STUDY

made a year ago, have proved to be highly satisfactory. We have now tried our plans for the work in drawing an entire year. We should be very unwilling to go back to the former arrangement. When the plan of substituting drawing for each of the regular studies once in two weeks was introduced, thus giving drawing lessons two days a week, it was thought that we should be able to accomplish nearly or quite as much as before with the regular studies on account of the recreative element in the drawing work. Our experience shows that we were not in error in that opinion.

The additional term in psychology has also proven to be highly satisfactory to all concerned.

We are endeavoring to strengthen the

#### PROFESSIONAL FEATURES

of our work all of the time. To this end, in addition to the regular faculty meetings which occur once in two weeks, we are spending two evenings each month in discussings ways and means to promote the general welfare of the school, and especially to formulate a distinct body of educational doctrine that may be kept before our classes and illustrated in the ordinary work of instruction. We hope to merit the name of a Normal School.

Since September of last year I have visited four Normal Schools and have studied their characteristic features. I desire to continue these visits until I shall know what is doing in those schools for teachers that have made honorable reputations.

#### OUR FINANCIAL CONDITION

is excellent, as is shown by the statement laid before you two weeks ago.

Thanking the Board of Education for the readiness shown to aid me in every possible way in the discharge of my extremely difficult and delicate duties, and asking your criticisms, not less than your approval, this report is respectfully submitted.

To the State Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Teachers and valaries begs leave to report as follows:

Since our last meeting we have received the resignations of Mr. Edward Manley, assistant in the high school, and Miss Ruth Morris, Preceptress and Professor of English Literature.

We recommend the following:

That Mr. Jacob A. Bohrer be appointed assistant in the high school in place of Mr. Manley, with a salary of \$850.

That Miss J. Rose Colby be appointed Preceptress and Professor of English Literature, with a salary of \$1,500, in place of Miss Morris, resigned.

That Miss Lucia W. Raines be appointed for this year assistant in reading, with a salary of \$800.

P. R. WALKER, W. R. SANDHAM, E. C. ROSSETER.

Mr. Edwards, from the Committee on Textbooks and Course of Instruction, moved that Meyer's General History be substituted for Swinton's "Outlines," as a textbook in Ancient and Mediæval History, and that Reed & Kellogg's "Higher Lessons in English" be used in the second term work in Grammar. Mr. Sandham seconded the motion and it was adopted.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds submitted the following report:

To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds beg leave to report. In accordance with instructions at the June meeting of the Board, plans were carefully considered for the new training school building and submitted to the architect for final revision. Bids were advertised for about July 1st, and were opened, as follows, about the 15th:

The contract was let to J. W. Evans & Son, and the work commenced at once.

Your committee thinks the price at which the contract was secured is a low one, and they are of the opinion that the work is being substantially done. They do find fault, however, in that the job is not being pushed nearly as rapidly as the contractors agreed. We have a time clause, with forfeit attached, taking effect after January first, and shall endeavor to hold the contractors on it, for any unnecessary delays after that date.

Your committee would be glad to have the members of the Board inspect the building while here.

BLOOMINGTON, ILL., Dec. 9, 1891.

To the Honorable Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen—On June 23, 1891, the date of my last report, I held as your treasurer a balance of \$7,072.75, since which time I have received from the State Treasurer \$31,746.78, consisting of the July and October quarterly installments of the appropriation for the ordinary expenses of the University, \$6,873.39 each, and \$18,000 for the building of a training school; from President J. W. Cook, for tuition, \$4,579.75, and from R. F. Evans, for rents, \$525, making, with balance, a total of \$43,924.28. The disbursement has amounted to \$29,701.07, as evidenced by fifty-one vouchers, which I return herewith, together with a detailed statement of account. The balance now in my hands is \$14,223.21.
