PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS.

NORMAL, ILL., June 23, 1897.

The Board of Education met in the office of the president of the university at 9 a.m., Judge William H. Green, president, in the chair.

Present: President Green, Messrs. Gastman, Capen, Sandham, Kimbrough, Walker, Shanahan, Norton, Baily, and Mrs. Ella F. Young.

Absent: Messrs. Inglis, Brady, Plain, Cook, Harrington.

The secretary being absent, F. D. Marquis was elected secretary $pro\ tem.$

Minutes of the last meeting were approved as printed.

Election of officers then followed. Judge Green, of Cairo, was unanimously re-elected president. F. D. Marquis was re-elected treasurer.

President Jown W. Cook read his report, which was accepted and the respective parts referred to the appropriate committees.

THE FACULTY.

Only one change is anticipated in our faculty. Mr. J. Irving Read, appointed last year, retires at the end of this term. His resignation will be presented by the committee on teachers. Mr. Read is a graduate of Dartmouth College and is a man of good scholarship and excellent character. He has been employed as assistant to Professor Manchester in the department of ancient and modern languages. I have recommended as his successor Miss Mary R. Potter, who left us one year ago for further study in Boston University, from which institution she has recently received a degree. Miss Potter did excellent service during the four years that she was with us. I shall be very much pleased indeed to see her in her old place. Dr. Charles A. McMurry, who left us last year on a leave of absence, has decided not to return. Mr. Louis H. Galbreath, appointed one year ago to take his place, has done admirably in every particular. I feel that we have been especially fortunate in securing his services. Being a graduate of this institution he dropped into our work again very naturally. Having subsequently graduated from Cornell University and having also taken a post-graduate course in that institution, his scholarship, as might be expected, is generous along the very lines upon which he is at work here. His experience of four years as training teacher in one of the Minnesota state normal schools made him thoroughly familiar with those professional ideas that we are especially endeavoring to press. I respectfully request the Board to make his appointment permanent.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

While there has been no change in our course of study this last year, so far as it appears in the catalogue, I feel that we have materially improved it in certain respects. Our professional work is growing in richness and interest all of the time. Mr. Galbreath, who has had charge of the work in pedagogy, in the second and third terms of the first year, has made a fuller use of the library for his classes than has been done heretofore.

I think it very desirable to introduce some changes into our three-year course for the purpose of encouraging our pupils to get at least one year of Latin. To this end I suggest that first term students be permitted to elect between reading and Latin, second term students between geography and Latin, and third term students between English grammar and Latin.

Nearly all of the pupils in the two-year course have had from three to four years of Latin. It is extremely desirable, however, that they should have at least one full term of work in the methods of teaching Latin. To that end I suggest that those desiring to do so be permitted to substitute Latin for the illustrative work and bookkeeping of the graduating term.

I requested the American Book Company to send to the committee on teachers, specimen copies of Halleck's Psychology with a view to its examination, for our uses in the first term of the second year, instead of the text now in use. The latter has not proved entirely satisfactory. I think Mr. Halleck's book will answer our purposes excellently.

THE PRACTICE SCHOOL.

I am glad to say that the work in the practice school is steadily improving. The features that we have made most prominent this year are the illustrative exercises on three mornings of each week and the teachers' meetings. These illustrative exercises consist of class recitations conducted by pupil teachers before the faculty of the practice school and the Normal pupils in charge of classes. These exercises are very carefully prepared, are given with the greatest pains and are afterwards reviewed elaborately in the teachers' meetings. We have found the exercises to be extremely profitable. Many attend them who are not required to do so and derive large benefits from them.

The teachers' meetings have been peculiarly instructive and interesting under the leadership of Dr. Van Liew. They have enlisted the warmest interests of the pupils and have given to the work of the institution a more

thoroughly professional character than it has ever had before. I wish, indeed, that it were possible for the members of the Board to see this phase of our work.

The discontinuance of our high school tended to diminish somewhat our grammar department. The hard times have also made the payment of tuition something of a burden. I suggest that the Board authorize me to make a change in our tuition rates, if found necessary to do so to secure a sufficient number of children for our practice work.

THE NEW BUILDING.

From Mr. Felmley, 28 vols, of The Nation.... From Dr. VanLiew, valuable educational periodicals... From Mr. Galbreath, valuable pamphlets

After an interesting campaign in Springfield the General Assembly finally gave us \$16,000 with which to complete our new building. We are now supplied with a very excellent plant for the purposes of a normal school. I assume that arrangements can be made for finishing the building so that it can be occupied shortly after the beginning of the new year at latest. The occupation of the new building will relieve the overcrowded condition of some of our rooms. It will enable us to double the space heretofore assigned to the literary societies, to enlarge the areas used for dressing rooms, to furnish an office to the preceptress where she may meet the young women, to furnish not less than two lunch rooms, a convenience heretofore very greatly needed. I suggest that this whole matter of the changes in the old building be referred to the committee on buildings and grounds, with power to act. The expense will be comparatively small. When these changes have been made, for the first time in the last ten years we shall be living in some sort of proper hygienec condition. I do not doubt that our financial showing will be a source of gratification to the Board. The bills to be met at the close of this term are few in number and their aggregate is small. In anticipation of the completion of the building I have endeavored to keep our expenditures as low as possible. We shall have the largest balance, I think, that we have had for many years at the end of the year. It will amount to about \$1,500.

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THE SUMMER TERM.

At the last meeting of the Board I broached the subject of a summer term for teachers. As was then suggested, we could not hope to carry out such a scheme without a very material increase in the faculty. I estimated that an addition to our present appropriation of not less than \$10,000 would be necessary to arrange our work on the 48-weeks plan. Any one who had to do with the General Assembly just adjourned knows how extremely difficult it would have been to increase the appropriation for ordinary expenses. I did not deem it wise, therefore, to ask for this increase.

In lieu of such an arrangement the faculty will hold a term of three weeks beginning July 12. It has been necessary to charge a tuition fee to compensate those who are to take part and to meet the ordinary running expenses. The present indications point to a large attendance.

THE FORTIETH ANNIVERS

The anniversary exercises now in progress mark an epoch in our history. The interest manifested by the educational people everywhere is some indication of the general prevalence of the belief in professional preparation for teachers. To those of us who have seen the gradual change in public sentiment upon this subject the occasion is full of encouragement. We trust that this institution may meet the onerous demands made upon it, to some fair degree, at least.

The resolution was adopted.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds then submitted the following report:

To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Your Committee on buildings and grounds would respectfully report that, acting under the instructions given at the last meeting of the Board, it, in connection with President Cook, has purchased apparatus for the gymnasium of Messrs. A. G. Spaulding & Bro. amounting to \$662.22. This includes \$13.75 cost of putting some of it in place. This amount has been paid.

Mr. Capen moved that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds take possession of and make such disposition as may seem proper of rooms in university building when they are made vacant.

The motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. Capen moved that \$225 be appropriated to pay for printing catalogue.

The motion was seconded and carried.

Upon roll call the vote was: Yeas—Green, Inglis, Gastman, Capen, Sandham, Kimbrough, Mrs. Young, Walker, Shanahan, Norton and Baily.

It was moved by Mr. Capen that orders be drawn as are necessary for the purchase of coal for the ensuing year, not to exceed a sum of \$1,000.

Upon roll call the vote stood: Yeas—Green, Inglis, Gastman, Capen, Sandham, Kimbrough, Mrs. Young, Walker, Shanahan, Norton and Baily.

Mr. Gastman moved that the chairman of Committee on Buildings and Grounds investigate the matter of paying for sidewalks around university grounds and report at next meeting.

The motion was carried.

Upon being instructed at the last meeting of the Board to have inspection made of condition of boiler in university building and the competency of the engineer, the Committee on Buildings and Grounds submitted the following report:

To Board of Education, Bloomington, Ill.:

The Hartford Steam Boiler Inspection and Insurance Company make the following report of the condition of your steam boilers inspected on the 13th of February, 1897, by Inspector H. E. Wallis:

TWO BOILERS.

Internally: Boilers are free from scale, but there is considerable oil in them, and this has been the cause of all the trouble; now that the cause has been removed, would advise that a sufficient amount of alkali or caustic soda be used in them, in manner explained, to entirely remove all oil from the plates. The bracing is sound and firm; openings to outside attachments are clear.

Externally: The fire sheet of No. 1 is badly bagged and will require a new sheet. This would be put on as explained, extending new plate back to the center on bottom, carrying the horizontal seams up to the original seams; this will take them out of the fire. When this is done the boiler will be in good condition, as no other defects are visible. No. 2 is sprung, but is not considered dangerous, and no harm will result if kept clean; otherwise shell plates are sound, also seams, tube ends and flanging. No blame can be attached to the engineer for the present condition. The water column connection of No. 2 should be changed, making it similar to No. 1. Steam gauges were corrected. It is very evident that the capacity of boilers is entirely insufficient for the work required, and an additional boiler should be added before another season. Until the repairs are made on No. 1 the pressure carried must not exceed forty pounds.

It was moved by Mr. Capen: Inasmuch as the new boiler is not in conformity with the agreement of the firms of Foss & Noble and of Sullivan & McCarthy to furnish a sufficient boiler, and inasmuch as said boiler is now out of repair, that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be and the same is hereby instructed to notify said firms of the insufficiency and defects in said boiler, and make a written demand on each of said firms that they repair said boiler and make it conform to their contract in relation thereto within a term to be fixed by said committee, and in case said firms fail, neglect or refuse so to do, that said committee proceed to have all necessary repairs made thereon and report its action to this Board at the next meeting.

The motion was carried.

President Green at this juncture called Mrs. Young to the chair.

Mr. Kimbrough moved that the Committee on Buildings and Grouds be instructed to contract for completion of new building and provide for suitable heating apparatus, etc., in its construction.

The motion was discussed by Messrs. Capen, Kimbrough, President Cook, Baily, Gastman and Walker, and prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Inglis, Gastman, Capen, Sandham, Kimbrough, Mrs. Young, Walker, Shanahan, Norton, Baily.

Mr. Walker moved to appropriate \$100 to the local member of the Board for services rendered.

The motion was carried upon roll call by the following vote: Yeas—Inglis, Gastman, Sandham, Kimbrough, Young, Walker, Shanahan, Norton, Baily.

The Committee on Text Books and Course of Study submitted the following:

To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

The Committee on Text Books and Course of Study recommends that students be permitted to use as text book "Halleck's Psychology," or any other psychology approved by the president of the university.

ELLA F. YOUNG, P. R. WALKER.

Mr. Walker then read the following report from the Committee on Teachers and Salaries:

To the Board of Education of the State of Illinois:

Your Committee on Teachers and Salaries have the honor of presenting the following:

We are pleased with the results of the year. The school seems to be advancing and doing broader and better work and preparing its students to become more useful in the schools of the State.

We have received the resignation of Mr. J. Irving Read as assistant teacher in ancient languages, and recommend it be accepted, and that Miss Mary R. Potter, who is a graduate of the Northwestern University, taught with us four years, and has spent the past year in post graduate work in the Boston University, where she will receive a degree, be re-appointed with a salary of \$1,000.

Mrs. McMurry's salary should be raised from \$1,300 to \$1,500, in order to retain her very valuable services. It would be very hard to fill her place. She ranks with the very ablest primary teachers in this country.

Miss Anna A. Stanley's salary should be increased from \$700 to \$800, and that of Mr. Andrew H. Melville's from \$800 to \$900.

We recommend that the president of the university be authorized to employ a physical instructor at a salary not to exced \$1,000. Also, that he may employ an additional teacher in the normal department at a salary not to exceed \$600, if the present force should be found inadequate on account of the increased number of students at the beginning of the year.

The practice school and the organization of the pedagogical work for the first year have been very much improved. Mr. Louis H. Galbreath has done his part well, and we recommend that he receive the appointment of supervisor of practice in place of Charles McMurry, who was given a leave of absence for a year and does not intend to return.

P. R. WALKER, E. R. E. KIMBROUGH,

Mr. Baily moved that the report be received and recommendations concurred in and approved.

Roll call on this motion resulted as follows: Yeas—Inglis, Capen, Sandham, Kimbrough, Mrs. Young, Walker, Shanahan, Norton, Baily. Nays—Gastman.

And the motion prevailed.

Mr. Walker moved that persons whose names had been submitted as graduates from the university be awarded their diplomas.

The motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. Gastman offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That power be given the president of the university to make such modifications in the rates of tuition in the various departments of the Normal School as may be necessary to secure a sufficient number of pupils for the practice classes.

Upon motion of Mr. Kimbrough, the resolution was adopted.

A motion by Mr. Walker prevailed that the Board take a recess subject to the call of the president.

After a recess of fifteen minutes President Green called the Board to order.

Mr. Kimbrough moved that the president be given as much time as he desired to make up his list of committees and have them inserted in these minutes.

The motion was carried.

Mr. Inglis presented a communication from Governor John R. Tanner. It was referred to Committee on Teachers and Salaries.

The Board adjourned to meet Tuesday, December 7, 1897.
